Paling To

The Final Challenge

Across the country today Anglican churches are celebrating Palm Sunday as a festival in the Church calendar. Christians celebrate Palm Sunday to remember the triumphal or victorious entry of Jesus Christ into Jerusalem on the last Sunday

before he was nailed to a cross. Jesus' purpose in riding into Jerusalem was to make public his claim to be their Messiah or Saviour and King of Israel in fulfilment of Old Testament prophecy. Many of the people of Jerusalem who saw Jesus arrive acknowledged or treated him as royalty by placing their cloaks or palm branches on the road before him, which was an act generally used for a king or important ruler. Immediately following this time of celebration in the ministry of Iesus, he begins his journey to the cross. Christians remember the last week of lesus' life when both the events of the triumphal entry and crucifixion occurred, during Holy Week, the last week of Lent immediately before and concluding on Easter Sunday. Palm Sunday marks the start of Holy Week: and during the Palm Sunday service small palm crosses made from palm leaves are given out to help make the connection between the triumphal entry with palm branches and the crucifixion on a cross; as Palm Sunday is a time to reflect on the suffering and death of Jesus. The kaupapa for this Palm Sunday is The Final Challenge, being the final challenge which lesus faced to obey God the Father and journey into lerusalem even though it would lead to suffering and death on a cross.

In the Old Testament passage for today from Isaiah 50, the person referring to himself is the Servant, Jesus Christ. He says that he has always obeyed God the Father (Isa. 50:5), even though he knew that such obedience would lead to physical and emotional suffering (Isa. 50:6). In fact, he humbly walked the path of obedience to God the Father all the way to death - his death on a cross (Mk. 15:37). God had sent Jesus into this world to provide a way for the lost to be saved. In order for Jesus to open this way of salvation, he had to die. He had to be nailed to a cross and put to death, the one innocent of sin dying for those guilty of sin to make it possible for God to forgive those guilty of sin and grant them eternal life.

Because Jesus accepted this final challenge and walked the path of obedience to God all the way to death in our place, God raised him to the highest place above and gave him the name that is greater than any other name (Phil. 2:9). And so, in honour of the name of Jesus all beings will one day fall on their knees and all will one day openly say that Jesus Christ is Lord (Phil. 2:10-11).

When Jesus died on the cross, he opened the way to God for all who want to be saved. The pātai today is what does his death mean for you? Are you saved? If not, come to Jesus now by inviting him into your heart to obey him so that he is Lord of your life. One day, even you, lost friend, will fall on your knees and will openly say that Jesus Christ is Lord. Does it not make more sense to make Jesus Lord of your life today and be saved, than to deny Jesus, die lost and still have to openly say that Jesus Christ is Lord some day? Do you not want to do it when it can save you instead of when it will be too late and can do you no good?

The Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 50:4-9a



A reading from Isaiah chapter 50 beginning at verse 4.

⁴ The LORD and King has taught me what to say. He has taught me how to help those who are tired. He wakes me up every morning. He makes me want to listen like a good student. ⁵ The LORD and King has unplugged my ears. I've always obeyed him. I haven't turned away from him. ⁶ I let my enemies beat me on my bare back. A reading from Philippians chapter 2 beginning at verse 5.

⁵ As you deal with one another, you should think and act as Jesus did.

⁶ In his very nature he was God. Jesus was equal with God. But Jesus didn't take advantage of that fact. ⁷ Instead, he made himself nothing. He did this by taking on the nature of a servant. He was made just like human beings. ⁸ He appeared as a man. He was humble and obeyed God completely. He did this even though it led to his death. Even worse, he died on a cross!

Jesus is Brought to Pilate

It was very early in the morning. The chief priests, with the elders, the teachers of the law, and the whole Sanhedrin, made their plans. So they tied Jesus up and led him away. Then they handed him over to Pilate.

They crucified with him two rebels against Rome. One was on his right and one was on his left. ²⁹ Those who passed by shouted at Jesus and made fun of him. They shook

their heads and said, "So you are going to destroy the temple and build it again in three Then come down from the cross! Save yourself!" ³¹ In the same way the chief priests and the teachers of the law made fun of him among themselves. "He saved others," they said. "But he can't save himself! ³² Let this Messiah, this king of Israel, come down now from the cross! When we see that, we will believe." Those who were being crucified with Jesus also made fun of him.

Jesus Dies At noon, darkness covered the whole land. It lasted three hours. ³⁴ At three o'clock in

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the afternoon Tesus cried out in a loud voice. "Eloi, Eloi, Iema sabachthani?" This means "My God, my God, why have you deserted me?" (Psalm 22:1) 35 Some of those standing nearby heard Jesus cry out. They said, "Listen! He's calling for Elijah."
